It's important to teach your child to use the internet and social media in a positive and respectful manner. Here are some tips to help keep your child safe online and avoid engaging in mean behavior.

Educate them on the impact of their words

1. Explain to your child how their words and actions online can affect others. Teach them that the internet is not anonymous and that their behavior online can have consequences in the real world.

Encourage empathy and kindness

2. Emphasize the importance of treating others with kindness and respect, both online and offline. Encourage your child to put themselves in the shoes of others and to think about how their words might make someone else feel.

Set clear expectations and boundaries

3. Establish clear rules and expectations for your child's online behavior. Set limits on screen time and establish consequences for breaking the rules. Make sure your child understands that being mean or bullying others online is not acceptable.

Monitor their online activity

4. Check in on your child's social media accounts and monitor their online activity. Be aware of who they are interacting with and what they are saying online. Look out for signs that your child may be involved in cyberbullying,. It may not always be a joke.

Have open and honest conversations

5. Create a safe and open environment for your child to talk about their online experiences. Encourage them to come to you if they ever feel uncomfortable or witness bullying online. Teach them to speak up and report any instances of cyberbullying to a trusted adult.
